any premature victory claims either. "We still have to win one more ball game," pitcher Dave McNally said after blanking Minnesota with three hils

Martin juggled his line-up for today's contest, naming John Roseboro to replace George Mitterwald as catcher and sending Ted Uhlaender to take over the left field spot from Bob Allison.

The Twins sorely need some hilling punch. They were held to four hits in their 4-3 12-in-ning loss Saturday and held hitless by McNally in the last seven innings of Sunday's struggle. Palmer has a 1-0 record
