Goalie Key to Victory

Those raggedy Oukland Seals, stomped on virtually at will by their opponents in the National Indexey League, stepped out of a back alley last night to shock the defending Starwey Cup champion Toronto Maple Leafs, 43, with a sturnshing four-goal third period rally.

And laughing up his sleeve loday, is carly-haired Gary Smith, the flamboyant but fighting second-string Oakland goalie.

"Irnlach (Torenté coach-GM) toid me I put en a good show but I couldn't win in this league," explained the 44, 215-pound rockie who was drafted last summer from the leafs. "Well, I feel pretty good right now.

"I wasn't sharp on their second goal, but for the most part, I was OK. Our defense and forwards played great. They were coming back to help all night and what a third period. It was sensational," he said.

After a scoreless first period, during which Toronto had territorial advantage but the Seals the better scoring opportunities, the Leafs came out hard and fast in the second.

But the Scals, apparently determined that they weren't going to lose four in a row to Toronto, came on like never before.
