Two scrappy rookies, a timely tripping penalty and the simple effectiveness of the straight - bladed hockey stick all helped the Oakland Seals last night to take over fourth place in the National Hockey League's West Division.

The highly vocal crowd of 5,246 went wild as the Seals had pulled one out of the fire with as thrilling a finish as seen this season at the Arena.

"I'd like to get a couple more like that," said the smil-ing, curly black-haired flardy in the dressing room later. "Earl was coming from be-hind the set and saw me, He made a great pass. I just took it and shot it with no hesita-

He paused for a moment to tenderly massage his chin, a little painful because of a six-stitch cut in it from being hit by a puck.

"I had some good experience in Providence," he add-ed. "I learned a lot from Dave Creighton (the Reds' coach) and Freddie Glover has given me a lot of confidence here. He has been letting me work on the power play and kill penalties. And I've got my weight up to 182 from the 174 I was at when I started the season here."

He was recalled just before the Minnesota game on Tuesday when Brian Perry was returned to the Reds. He's here while Howie Menard recovers from a bad knee injury.

"Joe is playing very well," commented Glover. "He was good in Minnesota and great against Philadelphia. He makes some super plays with the puck. He thinks. He waits for the hole to open and then makes his plays. He's better at that than some of our more experienced players.

"And did you ever take a look at Hardy's stick? It's got a straight blade. No curve in it at all. That's why he handles the puck so well. He can pass or shoot either way with-

out any problems.

"I'd say that the curved sticks which many of our players use cost us at least four goals last night. You just can't get away a good shot off the back side of a curved

Interestingly, four of the five goals scored in the game five goals scored in the game were on power plays. Bill Sutherland got the game opening score, and Earl Ingarfield got that one back, both on first period power plays. Terry Ball put the Flyers ahead in the second on a power play, and Hardy's game-winner was while Oak land had a man advantage.

The Seals, losers of only one of their last nine games, next play St. Louis Friday at the Coliscum while the North Stars visit L.A. Saturday before coming into Oakland for a big one on Sunday.
