Barons Stung By Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA (CPI) — After Priday, the Cleveland Burons might suggest to NHL officials that the Philadelphia Flyers be renamed the bees or the mosquitoes.

Stinging the Barons at every opportunity and swarming all over goalie Gary Edwards, the Flyers got two goals and an assist from Bobby Clarke to defeat Cleveland, 7-2, and regain first place in the Patrick Division.

The Flyers, who lead the New York Islanders by one point with two pames in hand, were coming off a lackluster 4-1 loss to Detroil Wednesday and quickly went to work erasing that memory in the unusual Friday matinee.

"In Detroit, we weren't that intense and they just outmuscled us in the corner," said center Orest Kindrachak, who contributed three assists. "When you kise like that, you've got to bounce back right away."

And bonnee they did, hitting, the Barons at every opportunity when the visitors had the puck. On offense, the Flyers made a habit of setting up in front of Edwards, who had to face 41 shots in the first two periods.

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The Flyers started quickly with three goals. Clarke opened the scoring of 25 seconds on a tip in that went off Edwards right shoulder. Reggie Leach then tipped in a shot from the point by Kevin McCarthy and Barry Dean scored on a scrainble from in front.

These close range goals and the Flyers offense got Edwards so frustrated in the second period that he stung back whacking Kindractink and drawing a minor penalty.

"It's a consulative thing that's been happening for about six years, not just with Kindrachuk but with all of them," Edwards said afterward, "Clarke, (Gary) burnboefer and some other Flyers, they always come in on you and push you around."

The first period ended with a free-for-all that resulted in 96 penalty manutes and the ejection of four defensemen — Philadelphin's Rick LaPointe and Andre DuPont and Cleveland's Mike Christie and Randy

Cleveland Chach Jack Evons wasn't as angry over the fights as he was over the goals.

"Those goals were rather soft — I didn't think much of them."
Evans said. "Clarke's goal shouldn't have been allowed. He had the stick over his head!"

Tom Bladon and Don Saleski added second period goals while Clarke and Bob Dailey seared in the final period. Dave Gardner scored a first period goal and Rick Bampton tallied the final Cleveland score.

"We were challenging them pretty good." Flyers Coach Fred Shero said. "We were bumping back whenever we had to. Bernie (Parent) was sharp when he had to be and saved some goals." In 'a rare Friday matinee performance, a veritable "Chorus Line" of Philadelphia Flyers took turns parading past beleaguered Cleveland goalie Gary Edwards.
